New Concord 4th Annual Community Day Promotes Community Connections



The Friends of New Concord (FONC) will host the 4th annual New Concord Community Day on Saturday, Sept. 5, bringing together residents, local businesses, families, and the Muskingum University community for a full day of activities in downtown New Concord.

Community Day was created to strengthen the connection between the Village of New Concord and the Muskingum University campus community. All events throughout the day include free admission, and there is no cost to participate in any of the games or activities, thanks to the generosity of event sponsors.

The day begins at 9 a.m. with a one-mile Fun Run starting at New Concord Elementary School.

Vendor Village will be open from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. in the Genesis Primary Care parking lot. Local artisans will offer a variety of handmade and locally made products, including cookies, clothing, jewelry, soaps, home décor, and more.

Kids' Fun will also take place from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the corner of Layton Drive and Maple Avenue. Activities will include crafts, a sandbox, a petting farm, putt-putt golf, and other family-friendly fun for all ages. A Touch a Truck event featuring local vehicles will be held behind Village Hall from noon to 1 p.m.

Beginning at 10 a.m., New Concord businesses offering goods or services of interest to college students will open their doors to Muskingum University students participating in the Community Day Shop Walk. The Shop Walk provides students an opportunity to become more familiar with the Village while giving local businesses a chance to introduce themselves and their services to the campus community.

Food trucks will be serving from 11 a.m. to 9 p.m. along Main Street and in the Village Hall parking lot. Food and treats will be available from The Hibachi Hut, What the Fizz, Smokin Chippers, Flying Naked Pig, Daily Double, and the Easy Squeeze Lemonade Stand.

The Party in the Park will begin at 3 p.m. at New Concord War Memorial Park and continue until 9 p.m. The evening will feature live music from Late Light, a band featuring Muskingum University professors,

The Zanesville High School Devilettes will celebrate 60 years this season. The Devilettes were formed in 1966 by their director, Wayne Carpenter, who directed the team for 56 years. Their current director is Lamia Mayle assisted by Jessica McLendon. There were no seniors on the first team, so the nucleus of the group was formed to continue for the following years.

Over the years, the Devilettes were forced to find places to practice, like the alcove at the old high school, in hallways, in the gym, or even in old

vacant buildings in downtown Zanesville. In 2011, a beautiful studio was part of the new middle school on the ZHS campus where the team continues to practice today. The Devilettes perform at all ZHS football games as well as several basketball games, in addition to many community events.

The group has also traveled the world! They participated in the New Year's Day Parade in London, England, and performed at Disneyland Paris in France. They were chosen to represent Ohio in a cultural exchange in Japan, as the Japanese

government paid for the entire 10-day trip.

The team also performed for several national football game halftime shows such as the Cincinnati Bengals, Cleveland Browns, and the Chicago Bears. In addition, they appeared in the Orange Bowl in 1977, the Peach Bowl in 1988 and 1989, as well as in the Fiesta Bowl in 1991 and 1992. They have also performed in Orlando at Disney World numerous times.

The Devilettes were crowned State Champions at the first statewide competition in 1974. The team won 31 of 33 state competitions. Now under director Lama Mayle, the Devilettes are once again entering competitions where they placed second last year.

The 60th Celebration will be held Friday evening, August 21 in which over 125 Alumni will return to John D. Sulsberger Memorial Stadium to perform at halftime. The returnees represent 15 different states as well as 31 different cities in Ohio. Saturday, from 10:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m., the alumni office in the Zanesville Administration building on Moxahala Avenue will be open so that the team can socialize and look over their scrapbooks. In the evening, on Saturday, the former Devilettes will have dinner together in the cafeteria at ZHS. After dinner, there will be special entertainment and several surprises for the 60-year Devilette alumni.

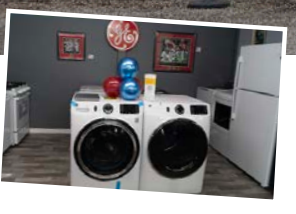
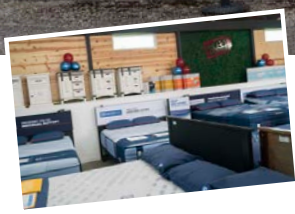
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OBITUARY

Professor Sara Ann Sewell to Deliver Miriam G. Schwartz Lecture on the Sounds of the November Pogrom

Muskingum University will host the annual Miriam G. Schwartz Lecture on Monday, Oct. 12, at 7 p.m. in BSC 343. This year's lecture will be delivered by Sara Ann Sewell, Professor of History at Batten University.

Sewell's lecture, "10 November 1938: A Day of Relentless Sonic Violence against Jews in Germany," will examine the November Pogrom, also known as Kristallnacht, from an innovative perspective: through its sounds and the experiences of the

Jewish people who endured it.

On Nov. 10, 1938, rank-and-file Nazis took to the streets throughout Germany, attacking Jewish people and their property in a pogrom coordinated by the Nazi state. Approximately 2,000 synagogues, 10,000 businesses, and countless homes were destroyed. Several hundred Jewish men and women were murdered, and approximately 30,000 Jewish men were imprisoned in the Third Reich's expanding incarceration network.

The November Pogrom marked a significant escalation in the Nazi persecution of Jews and has been widely studied by Holocaust scholars. Sewell's lecture will offer a different way of understanding the event by exploring its violent soundscape. Drawing on Jewish testimonies, she will examine how those who experi-

enced the pogrom heard its violent cacophony and what those sounds reveal about their sensory and emotional experiences during the attacks and their aftermath.

Sewell is a Professor of Modern European Cultural and Gender History at Batten University. Her current research explores the experiences of Holocaust victims, with a particular focus on their auditory, sensory, and emotional lives. She is currently writing the monograph "Sounding, Hearing, Silencing: Experiencing the Holocaust through the Sonic" with Purdue University Press.

Her recent publications include "Emotional Dissimulation in the Holocaust: The Affective Lives of Jewish Adolescent Girls and Young Women," published in Holocaust Studies: A Journal of Culture and History in 2026, and "Screams: Expressions of Fear Thundering in Holocaust Soundscapes," published in Holocaust and Genocide Studies in 2025.

The Miriam G. Schwartz Lecture Series was founded in 1993 by Dr. Miriam G. Schwartz, a distinguished scholar and longtime faculty member at The Ohio State University's Center for Slavic and East European Studies and a member of the Muskingum University Board of Trustees. The series was inaugurated in 1995, marking the 50th anniversary of the end of World War II. Dr. Schwartz's gift to Muskingum reflects her lifelong dedication to Holocaust remembrance and her desire to encourage critical reflection on the consequences of prejudice and hatred.

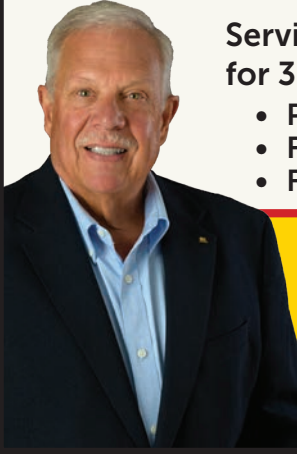
